Measles Update – Important Information for Whānau

Health New Zealand has let schools know there is an increasing risk of measles across the country. Since 20 October, there have been 13 confirmed cases, and measles is now present in Northland, Auckland, Manawatū, Nelson, and Wellington. It's likely more cases will appear in other parts of Aotearoa.

Measles spreads very easily, especially in schools and early learning settings. It's a serious illness — about one in three people with measles may need hospital care. It spreads through the air when someone with measles breathes, coughs, or sneezes.

What to look out for:

If your child develops any of these symptoms, please keep them

at home and call your doctor or Healthline (0800 611 116) for advice:

- Fever
- Cough
- Runny nose
- Sore, red eyes
- A blotchy rash (appears a few days after other symptoms)

If someone in your household is diagnosed with measles, anyone who has been in close contact will need to stay home for a period of time. Health New Zealand will give families clear quidance about this.

The best protection against measles is immunisation.

People are considered protected if they've had two doses of the MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) vaccine, or if they've had measles before.

We encourage all whānau to check their own and their children's immunisation status through My Health Record, or by contacting your family doctor.

Totara Tree

After talking with our Kaumātua, Atutahi and the Board we've decided the tree needs to be removed. A karakia will be held before it is cut down, and everyone is welcome to join us.


