Healthy behaviours we encourage at Deanwell School.

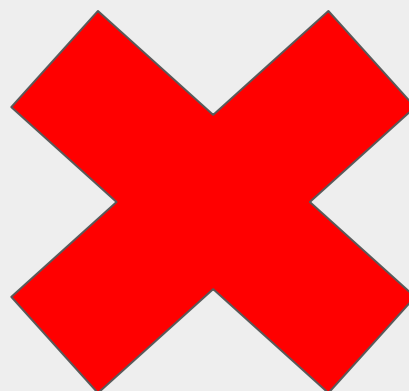

Even Coke ZERO is bad for teeth

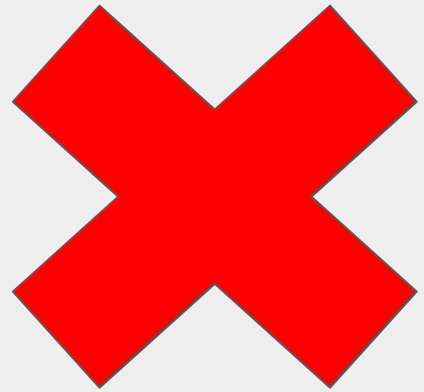


We also have a no lollies rule at school.

High-sugar foods can impact students' ability to focus and regulate their behaviour in ways that align with our school values. They also damage their teeth.

No Lollies

The dental therapists have been working in our school, and overall, student dental health is a concern. Too many sugary things and not enough cleaning.
